Scripture: Job 29:20 (NIV)

"My glory was fresh in me, and my bow was renewed in my hand."

Arrows have been used throughout recorded History or even earlier. When looking at arrows we also must consider the bow as well. We can ask what does a bow do? Of course we know the answer, it is needed to shoot the Arrows. Shooting the arrows requires skills such as accuracy and aim but it also requires us to have strength in order to draw back the bow string. When living a Christian life, it requires strength as well. We cannot live a Christ centered life on our own. We have to rely on the Strength of the Lord and we can attain this strength by reading His word and fellowshiping with other Christians that builds us up. So how do we keep that strength renewed in our hands? I think the parts of an arrow can help us.

There are four parts of the Bow that we can look at to guide us in our Christian walk.

1. Stabilizer: This part of the bow provides stability for the arrow as it glides through the air. What gives us as Christians stability? Reading God's word, Prayer and fellowship with other believers. Read Hebrews 4:12.
2. Arrowhead: The penetrating end of the entire arrow. How does this relate to us as Christians? We are the ones that bring others to Christ. Read 2 Cor. 5:15 & 5:20.
3. Noche: Holds the Arrow in place. What keeps us in place? Our Prayer lives of course! When we spend time in prayer it keeps us focused or grounded. Read Hebrews 4:16
4. Shaft: The body of an arrow. When we look at this we can say that Salvation is our Salvation is our beginning. Salvation is what we build upon as a Christian. We have to have that in place first. Accepting Christ is key before we can build a relationship with Him and sharing His word and love with others. Read John 1:12.

Sometime you need to restring your Bow to make it strong again. We can "restring" or renew of faith by reading God's word and keeping our prayer life active. Sometimes we think "If I could just have more rest I would be great" but the case is Our rest must come from the Lord. When we rest in his word and love our path becomes straight and true, just like the arrow guiding through the air when all components of the bow and arrow are set.

Scripture: Romans 12:4-8 (NIV)

“For just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others. We have different gifts, according to the grace given to each of us. If your gift is prophesying, then prophesy in accordance with your faith; if it is serving, then serve; if it is teaching, then teach; if it is to encourage, then give encouragement; if it is giving, then give generously; if it is to lead, do it diligently; if it is to show mercy, do it cheerfully.”

Have you ever thought of all the pieces it takes for an engine to work? Car engines are basically built around cylinders that burn fuel, which move pistons that work with a carburetor to set off a spark plug which helps to move a crankshaft, which powers a gearbox, and then turns the wheels. All of these parts are partnered with gaskets, coolants, belts, batteries, fuses, valves, and more to make an engine work. If one part chooses to not work or breaks down the whole engine suffers. If a small part is missing it can cause the whole engine to not work.

In the book of Romans Paul compares us to a body and claims each of us has a gift to share with the others. Sometimes we can consider ourselves unimportant or unnecessary but just like an engine won't function right without a working piston, so will your church struggle if you don't use your gifts. Do you have the gift of teaching, of service, or of encouragement? How does God want you to use these gifts? Do you have the gifts of prophesy (proclaiming God's truth), mercy or teaching? Are you using these gifts?

Scripture: 2 Timothy 3:12-17 (NIV)

All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work."

Knowing the bible is essential to the maintenance of our faith. But why is it important to study it?

Think of all the reasons why we need to study in school. What is the number one reason why you study in school?

We study in school to make sure we get good grades, pass tests, and know the material our teachers are covering because we need to graduate, right? Well, the reasons we study the bible are similar to the ways we study in school, but deal with much more than temporary things – they deal with our souls.

Knowledge of the bible can help us through trials in our life. There's nothing better than going into a test and realizing you are completely prepared. In your life, you will face tests all the time, and just like scripture says, scripture is useful and can fully equip you for the work God has planned for you.

Knowing the Bible = knowing God. The first verse of the book of John goes *"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God."* As you start to engage in a meaningful relationship with God, studying the Bible gives you access to the very character of God. Through bible study and prayer God will reveal who He is and just how much he cares for you!

"But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To him be the glory both now and forever! Amen." 2 Peter 3:18

When I was in school, my grandparents would pay me for good grades. Scripture: Colossians 3:15-17 (NIV)

“Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace. And be thankful. Let the message of Christ dwell among you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom through psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts. And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.”

To this day there is even a festival in the Jewish religion called Purim celebrating her actions. Esther relied on God to tell her the kind of woman she should be, not society or culture. Just like in music we must rely on theory and the notes to tell us what kind of piece we are playing or singing.

It's your choice what kind of song your life will be. Will you use it to glorify God, and show others how amazing he is? Or will you use it to sound like the world and fit in? You can change your song. You have that choice everyday as to who you are going to sound like.

If we were baking a chocolate cake for a fundraiser and we didn't have any baking soda, our chocolate cake would not turn out very nicely. It would be hard as a rock, and probably wouldn't taste too great either. Could you still frost this cake, and decorate it well? Of course you could. It would be pretty flat, but you could use your excellent cake decorating skills to liven it up, and make it look perfect. But as soon as the cake was cut and the first bite was taken, it would be obvious that the cake was bad. The outside of the cake might have looked beautiful and tasted sweet, but the inside would be hard and unappealing.

At times, it may seem like our outward appearance is all that matters. If we look pretty, have nice teeth, or shiny hair, then we are more valuable. Even if we look great on the outside, sometimes our insides are not beautiful. God doesn't care about what is on the outside. God cares about our hearts. He cares about our motives, thoughts and intentions. If you look into your own heart and see that maybe it is not as pure as God wants it to be, don't be discouraged. Confess less than pure motives to God and not only will He forgive you, but He will guide you back on the path of becoming more like Christ.

Candy Cane season is here and they are everywhere. You've probably seen them hanging on Christmas Trees, in someone's candy bowl, or on top of peppermint mochas! Yum! There are several stories about the history and meaning of the candy cane, and it's funny that a popular Christmas treat like the candy cane can teach us about the true meaning of Christmas.

J

First, if you look at the candy cane upside down it looks like the letter J. The J should remind us of Jesus. The Christmas season isn't just about getting presents, it is a time to celebrate the birth of our savior, Jesus.

Shepherd's Crook

If you look at the candy cane right side up it looks like a shepherd's crook. The shepherd used his crook to keep the sheep from wandering away from the flock and getting lost or eaten by wild animals. John 10:11 says, "The Lord is my shepherd." The candy cane reminds us that Jesus is our shepherd. The devil likes to distract us from Jesus, so that we get lost and he can come in and mess with our lives. Jesus will keep us from wandering if we keep our eyes focused on him.

White

The candy cane is mostly white. White is a symbol of purity. 1 John 1:7 says, "But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus, his Son, purifies us from all sin." This should remind us that Jesus was the spotless Lamb of God and he came to be the sacrifice for our sin, so that we can become as white as snow.

Red Stripes

As you can see, the candy cane has red stripes. The Bible tells us that before Jesus was crucified, he was beaten with a whip which made blood-red stripes across his back. Matthew 26:28 says, "This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins." The Bible says that we are healed by those stripes. The stripes on the candy cane should remind us that Jesus suffered and died, so that we could have everlasting life.

Sweet

The sweetness of the candy cane reminds us that God Loves us and wants us to enjoy the many gifts He has given us. John 3:16 says, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son, that whosoever believes in Him shall not perish but have everlasting life." The greatest gift was the gift of His Son, who came into the world, suffer, died, and rose again. When Jesus rose, he defeated death and now we can have victory in Jesus Christ.

To many people, the candy cane is a meaningless decoration seen at Christmas time or just a piece of candy to be eaten and enjoyed. But, this year, every time you see a candy cane be reminded that Jesus is the Reason for the Season. He was sent by God to earth in order to save us from our sins.

Scripture: Deuteronomy 4:9 (NLT)

“But watch out! Be careful never to forget what you yourself have seen. Do not let these memories escape from your mind as long as you live! And be sure to pass them on to your children and grandchildren.”

Today, we are fully capable of capturing our memories with a simple click of a button. We have cameras readily available to us by way of the digital world. Almost gone are the days of taking film to the store and waiting days for our pictures to be processed. We simply take our little cell phones and snap a picture then sync those pictures onto our computers and print them instantly. We can also instantly share these photos on social media sites. We must however take caution with the world of social media because once our pictures are out there for everyone to see, we can't take them back.

In this portion of Scripture, Moses was giving God's instructions to the Israelites before they entered into to their new land. He wanted the Israelites to remember everything that had happened to them before arriving in the Promised Land. He also wanted them to follow the life giving instructions God was giving to them. Moses wanted the Israelites to live God honoring lives and to pass on these instructions for future generations to live by. These instructions could have been easily lost throughout the centuries, but God loves us so much that He made absolutely certain that it didn't happen. Today, we still have those same God given instructions set before us to follow and hold true to. Our instruction book is the Bible.

It's simple,
Set yourself before God each day in prayer.
Follow what He is calling you to do.

- In Genesis 7:2 we see that Moses was to take with him seven pairs of clean animals, birds and one pair (2 animals a male and female) of all unclean animals (about 7000 total animals). The bible clearly excludes fish and other sea creatures and probably excludes insects and invertebrates as well.

Noah's faithfulness to the Lord was incredible. Even as those around him probably thought he was crazy, he pushed through and built this unbelievable Ark. Has God ever asked you to step out in faith and do something so bold that others might assume you are irrational or wild? Did you do it? Why or why not? What propelled you? What held you back?

Sometimes the hardest thing to do is to listen to the Lord. God in his faithfulness and love will lead us and help us navigate this world of darkness and sin. However, we must be listening for His voice; pushing through the negative messages of the world to hear His Truth.

Masks can be fun, but the Word of God gives us a bit of caution about wearing spiritual and social masks. Just like the masks worn during the Mardi Gras celebration, you have the ability to put on an invisible mask and pretend to be anyone you want to be. You can socialize with whomever you want. But, be very careful because these invisible masks often get you into a lot of trouble. Remember the movie Mean Girls? Lindsay Lohan's character, Cady Heron moved to a new school and wanted to take down the mean, snobby, popular girls. She became friends with these girls only to embarrass and humiliate them publicly. In her manipulative maneuvering she was able to take them down, but not without hurting a lot of people and degrading her own self-image. She wore a mask of manipulation and played games with other people's lives. This is not God-honoring in any way. Be careful that you are not wearing a mask that misrepresents God's presence and light in your life. As Christians, we are meant to shine the glory of God within us, but too often we are scared that we won't be liked or we will be misunderstood and made out to be a joke; so we put on a "mask" and hide the truth of who we are while also hiding the light of God within us. This doesn't help anyone. You were created to shine; so shine! You are more than whatever mask you choose to hide behind. Be bold and show the world a beautiful truth - you! Masks can be fun, but they often hide the truth. Remember to keep everything out in the open, honest and true so that your life can shine the light of God.

Go to your kitchen and grab the saltshaker. Now, shake a small amount of salt into the palm of your hand. Next, dab some salt into your mouth- but make sure it's enough to where this becomes a challenge. Now let's go over the following questions:

- Can you have too much salt in something? What happens if you do?
- How do you get rid of too much salt?

Remember, once the saltiness is there, there's not too much you can do to remove it, especially in food. Too much salt creates bitterness.

Bitterness can be like a poison, like too much salt, that can infect our lives. In this verse of Hebrews, the author compares bitterness to a root that overtakes our hearts and causes trouble in many other areas of our lives. We might think our feelings of bitterness, anger, and resentment are justified, but they aren't. Those feelings will only be hurtful and destructive—to ourselves as well as to the person who hurt us. God's Word teaches us to forgive and also not let the sun go down while we're angry. (Ephesians 4:26).

When we hold onto bitterness and anger, we give the devil a place to work in our hearts and in our relationships. Don't allow the enemy room in your heart to plant weeds of bitterness between friends. Instead chose forgiveness and don't let a bitter root take hold in your heart.

It also needs the right amount of sunshine. Other elements also affect the growth of the tree. Too much cold or too much heat can affect how a tree produces fruit as well. In our lives, in order to produce fruits of the spirit, we must also make sure that we are rooted in the Right Soil. Take a moment to re-read the verse above.

Keeping in step with the Spirit, like gardening, takes a lot of tending. In order to feed our soul, we must keep our minds in God's Word. This gives us direction and guidance when we wonder how to keep on the path God's wants us to. In order to keep rooted, we must also pray to our Lord. A good prayer life allows us to connect to God. It is a physical, emotional, and mental way to be a reciprocal part of the relationship between you and God. This allows His nutrients, His blessings, to flow to you.

In order to continue to grow in His light, we must open our hearts to His leading. A flower that is wilted, cannot drink in the sunlight. We must be open to His prodding. Open up fully, and soak Him in. A tree that produces fruit, does so to spread seed to grow more trees. The fruit of the Spirit does the same. Each of the fruit of the Spirit (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control) are seeds that when placed in the outside world can plant the seed of God into others. We can't be afraid to let go of the fruit and to use it for God's kingdom. So don't hoard the fruit! Allow it to spread the love of God!

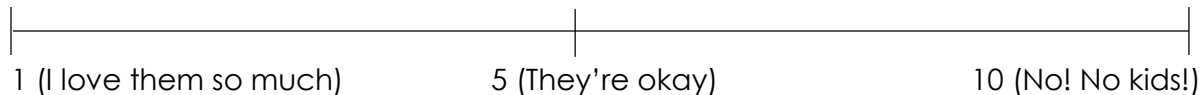

Around 1804 President Thomas Jefferson ordered a mission, which would later be known as *The Luis and Clark Expedition*. Captain Meriwether Lewis lead the group of U.S Army volunteers, along with his good friend Second Lieutenant William Clark. This journey would last a little over two years. The purpose of this expedition was to explore and map out the land in the newly acquired territory, develop a route that would span from the East to the West, and establish an American presence in the areas before European powers tried to claim ownership. The group had the help of a local Shoshone Indian woman named Sacagawea. Along the way she acted as their diplomatic advisor to other tribes, as well as bringing a sense of peace and reassurance. Sacagawea is credited with contributing to the success of The Lewis and Clark Expedition.

I am sure that there were some pretty terrifying moments during the expedition. No doubt, Lewis and Clark probably felt discouraged and afraid. However, they remained faithful to their journey. They braved climate conditions, varying terrain, and cultural differences.

God wants us to be brave. He doesn't want us to be consumed with fear. Even though the scripture was a command to Joshua, it is still relevant for us today. Go out into the world and conquer whatever task is in front of you. Know that you are loved. You have no reason to live in fear because you have been redeemed!

Scripture: Luke 17:11-19 (NIV)

"11 Now on his way to Jerusalem, Jesus traveled along the border between Samaria and Galilee. 12 As he was going into a village, ten men who had leprosy^[a] met him. They stood at a distance 13 and called out in a loud voice, "Jesus, Master, have pity on us!" 14 When he saw them, he said, "Go, show yourselves to the priests." And as they went, they were cleansed. 15 One of them, when he saw he was healed, came back, praising God in a loud voice. 16 He threw himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him—and he was a Samaritan. 17 Jesus asked, "Were not all ten cleansed? Where are the other nine? 18 Has no one returned to give praise to God except this foreigner?" 19 Then he said to him, "Rise and go; your faith has made you well."

Jesus was a great healer. He not only was able to heal physical issues like we've learned to do these last few weeks, but he was able to truly heal people from the inside out. Take a moment to reread and meditate on the passage above.

Until recently, when you had leprosy you became an outcast, or a social pariah, until you suffered from a slow and painful death. No one wanted to associate with lepers, kind of like when we play tag, you ran away from the person that was "it". Even though lepers were considered unclean, Jesus went to a group of ten of them and healed them. And yes, they were physically healed, but the tenth leper; he was healed not only on the outside. Something changed within him. He wasn't the same as before. He came back and fell face down at the feet of Christ in pure and unbridle praise and thankfulness!

To make things even more amazing, that tenth leper was a Samaritan! Someone who was basically born as an enemy to Jesus, yet he was so changed that he fell to His feet. These last few weeks we've been learning about ways to heal people, and what to do in case of emergencies, but no matter how gifted we are in First Aid or CPR, we will never be able to match the awesome power of Christ. Just by saying, "Go show yourselves to the priest" He was able to change and influence a life so greatly! That's amazing! Awe inspiring! And that is the God we serve!

So, now you know all the facts of The Salvation Army. What about the stories behind them? How did you end up at The Salvation Army? Was it a family member, a friend, a corps officer or youth leader? Maybe it was some other person? Whoever it was, your first point of contact was a person. That is one of the unique characteristics of The Salvation Army. The Salvation Army does not have church "members," but "soldiers." The name conveys an expectation of action. Soldiers do not simply observe, they are expected to do something. The Salvation Army is referred to as a "movement." This word gives us a great picture of what The Salvation Army was created to do – move. You see, The Salvation Army, like its soldiers, is about movement.

Acts 2 tells the story of when the Holy Spirit came on the disciples. To get us all on the same page, let's review what happened. Jesus had risen from the dead, witnessed to His disciples about His conquering death and then He returned to Heaven. Jesus had always been with them physically until this point. He even directed them in exactly what they should do. When they were scared, He was there to comfort them. Things were about to change, but Jesus promised them someone who would take His place.

This brings us to Acts 2. At the beginning of the book, the disciples are waiting for the Holy Spirit Jesus promised. When the Spirit falls on them, it is more than they could have imagined. Those who had been afraid were not, and those who had tripped over their words before suddenly spoke clearly. In fact, Peter gets up and preaches a sermon to the nearby crowd. In it, Peter explains to the crowd that this is God's working in them. He shares the truth about Christ raising from the dead, and then challenges all who listen to accept Him as King.

This chapter is a great description about what The Salvation Army was meant to be. It is a movement, led by the Holy Spirit, and equipped to share with those they come into contact with.

Scripture: Psalm 139:13-15a (NIV)

"For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well. My frame was not hidden from you when I was made in the secret place, when I was woven together in the depths of the earth."

Is there something about yourself that you might hide or change if you could? Perhaps something big? Perhaps something small? If you're like me, you might have a small list of issues. There are two things to keep in mind: no one is perfect, but every person is special.

David, the writer of most of the Psalms, wasn't perfect by any means – and some of the mistakes he made? Huge! Not only were they the kind of mistakes other people could see, he even wrote songs about them! Check out Psalm 51:4-5. David had sinned in a huge way, someone called him out on it, and he repented, which is what the 51st Psalm is about. But let's face it; we all have issues, physically, emotionally and spiritually, that we don't like and we can take a lesson from David. If it is a spiritual issue, God can take it, make our heart new, and give us a right spiritual mind (Psalm 51:10).

What about emotional issues? David struggled here as well and showed signs of both depression and anxiety? And how did he handle? You may have guessed – he wrote songs about these, too. Here are some of David's thoughts on how he feels when he struggles emotionally:

God is close to those with broken hearts and spirits (Psalm 34:18).

God is with us, even in the valley of the shadow of death (Psalm 23:4).

God is our hiding place and will fill our hearts with deliverance (Psalm 32:7).

The bottom line? When you are in need of emotional care? God hasn't left you!

Finally, what about physical needs? Let's look at another person in the Bible – the apostle Paul. He had a physical issue that caused him real discomfort, so much so that he wrote about it in a letter. He prayed several times for God to remove it, but it didn't happen. 2 Corinthians 3:8, in the New Living Version, says that he actually "begged" God to take it away. Ultimately, God didn't, but he assured Paul that, though this physical issue was there, He would be right there with him all his life.

What does all this mean? God knows we aren't perfect and we struggle at times. Whether that struggle is spiritual, physical, or emotional, we are not alone. He is with us, and he took great care when he made us. God made you! You are his creation! You are special to him!

"Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, left the Jordan and was led by the Spirit into the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing during those days, and at the end of them he was hungry. The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, tell this stone to become bread." Jesus answered, "It is written: 'Man shall not live on bread alone.'" The devil led him up to a high place and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. And he said to him, "I will give you all their authority and splendor; it has been given to me, and I can give it to anyone I want to. If you worship me, it will all be yours." Jesus answered, "It is written: 'Worship the Lord your God and serve him only.'" The devil led him to Jerusalem and had him stand on the highest point of the temple. "If you are the Son of God," he said, "throw yourself down from here. For it is written: 'He will command his angels concerning you to guard you carefully; they will lift you up in their hands, so that you will not strike your foot against a stone.'" Jesus answered, "It is said: 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test.'" When the devil had finished all this tempting, he left him until an opportune time. Jesus returned to Galilee in the power of the Spirit, and news about him spread through the whole countryside."

Like Jesus in this story, we, too, are faced with temptation. It is always Satan, our enemy, that brings temptation to us. God will never tempt anyone. How do we handle temptation? What do we do? Often we can give in to how we feel; even thinking it's not that bad. Sometimes temptation to do what's wrong comes disguised as something that seems alright. Looking at it on the surface often doesn't look too bad. And after all, 'everybody's doing it'. But don't be fooled. Satan has a way of disguising it. We need to follow Jesus' example. How did He respond to Satan's attacks? Each time Jesus answered Satan, He answered with scripture – 'It is written...'. We need to know what the word of God says. The other thing to remember is that Satan also knows scripture, too – but often it is used in the wrong way.

Is there anything you find you get tempted with? Maybe you feel tempted to lie so you don't get in trouble, or take something you want that is not yours, or say mean things to someone because they may have said mean things to you. There are so many things Satan tempts us to do that we shouldn't do. When you feel tempted, the best thing to do is to pray to Jesus to help you. He knows how you feel because He was tempted too.

Keep watch and pray, so that you will not give in to temptation. For the spirit is willing, but the body is weak! - Matthew 26: 41 (NLT)
